

**Smoking Law Status in State Capital Cities and District of Columbia**
*July 5, 2010*

The following table shows whether workplaces, restaurants, and freestanding bars are 100% smokefree in state capitals, the District of Columbia, and the capital of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico. An asterisk (\*) indicates that the applicable law was enacted by the state, commonwealth, or county. The table also indicates whether a state or commonwealth capitol building is 100% smokefree and whether a state or commonwealth preempts local control of smokefree laws. Call or write the local chamber of commerce or restaurant association to let them know either that you appreciate the location's smokefree law or that you are disappointed in the lack of a smokefree law.
